Q1. Can children of U.S. citizens attend Canadian schools?

Yes. Children of U.S. citizens can attend Canadian public schools if their parent or guardian has valid immigration status in Canada — such as a work permit, study permit, permanent residency, or citizenship. Public schooling is generally free for residents.

However, if the parent or guardian is in Canada on a visitor visa without residency or permit status, the child may be considered an international student and tuition fees will apply.

Pro Tip (AHOM[™] RMC): Proof of status is key. Having the right permit not only secures access to schools but also saves thousands in potential tuition fees.

Q2. Do I pay international student tuition at universities/colleges?

Yes. Unless you have Canadian permanent residency or citizenship, you 'II be classified as an international student. Tuition for international students ranges from \$10,000–\$25,000 CAD per year depending on the program and institution.

Some provinces also charge international fees for K–12 education (often \$10,000–\$15,000 CAD annually).

Pro Tip (AHOM™ RMC): Check whether your child may qualify for domestic tuition through a parent 's work or study permit. Many families are surprised to learn that permits can dramatically reduce education costs.

Q3. What documents are required for school enrollment?

The following are generally required for enrolling children in Canadian schools:

- Immunization/vaccination records (mandatory for most provinces).
- Proof of address (lease, utility bill, etc.).
- Transcripts or report cards from the previous school.
- Immigration documents (study permit, work permit, PR card, etc.).
